


Fig. 1. Area maps. (A) Map of Turpan, Xinjiang, China and its location in Central Asia. (B) Map of Yanghai Tombs site and surrounding ar (adapted from Xinjiang Institute of Cultural Relics and Archaeology, 2004).





The origins of cannabis smoking: Chemical residue evidence from the first millennium BCE in the Pamirs

Cannabis is one of the oldest cultivated plants in East Asia, grown for grain and fiber as well as for recreational, medical, and ritual purposes. It is one of the most widely used psychoactive drugs in the world today, but little is known about its early psychoactive use or when plants under cultivation evolved the phenotypical trait of increased specialized compound production. The archaeological evidence for ritualized consumption of cannabis is limited and contentious. Here, we present some of the earliest directly dated and scientifically verified evidence for ritual cannabis smoking. This phytochemical analysis indicates that cannabis plants were burned in wooden braziers during mortuary ceremonies at the Jirzankal Cemetery (ca. 500 BCE) in the eastern Pamirs region. This suggests cannabis was smoked as part of ritual and/or religious activities in western China by at least 2500 years ago and that the cannabis plants produced high levels of psychoactive compounds.


- Ten wooden braziers exhumed from 8 tombs
- Cannabinol, oxidative product of THC, found on the wooden vessels and stones
- Cannabis was of high THC concentration suggesting possible cultivation
- Cannabis used as part of ritual and/or religious activities


Archaeologists have spotted signs of ancient cannabis use from western China to the Caucasus.



CANNABIS AS MEDICINE

- Marijuana (cannabis, hemp) is one of the oldest known psychoactive plants
- First reported use as medicine ~ 3000 years ago
- Introduced into Western medicine in 1840's by Dr. W.B. O'Shaughnessy
- Promoted for putative analgesic, sedative, anti-inflammatory antispasmodic and anticonvulsant properties

CANNABIS AS NOT MEDICINE

- Early 1900's: Interest waned with advent of opiates, barbiturates, chloral hydrate, aspirin and syringes
- 1937: First US restrictions with Marihuana Tax Act (\$1/oz for medical use, \$100/oz for recreational users)
- 1942: Removed from US Pharmacopoeia
- 1951: Boggs Act includes cannabis with narcotics
- 1961: United Nations Single Convention Treaty classified cannabis as a dangerous narcotic
- 1970: US Controlled Substances Act placed cannabis in Schedule I



FOR THE TREATMENT OF ANOREXIA ASSOCIATED WITH WEIGHT LOSS IN PATIENTS WITH AIDS

A significant appetite improvement was achieved at week 4 of a 6-week study. Trends toward improved body weight and mood, and decreases in nausea were also seen during the same 6-week study, but these results were not statistically

MARINOL was well tolerated. Side effects were generally mild and reversed by dosage reduction. 





Do you think the use of marijuana should be made legal, or not? (%)









AGRICULTURAL IMPROVEMENT BILL 2018

- Also known as the Farm Bill
- Removed industrial hemp (cannabis with < 0.3% THC)
 from the Controlled Substances Act
- Reaffirmed FDA regulatory authority for hemp-derived medications, dietary supplements and food additives
- CBD derived from plant with >0.3% THC is still
 Schedule I in the eyes of DEA

WHO EXPERT COMMITTEE ON DRUG DEPENDENCE: 40^{TH} REPORT 2018

- There are no case reports of abuse or dependence relating to the use of pure CBD
- No public health problems have been associated with CBD use
- CBD has been found to be generally well tolerated with a good safety profile
- The Committee recommended that preparations considered to be pure CBD should not be scheduled
